## Trump Push on Jets for Turkey Sets Up Clash With Congress

### Law bars the country for its use of Russian air-defense system

ANKARA, Turkey—President Trump said he would consider selling the F-35 jet fighter to Turkey, signaling his embrace of Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan and setting up a potential showdown with U.S. lawmakers who have long opposed such a deal.

Trump spoke alongside Erdogan at the presidential complex in the Turkish capital, where he landed Tuesday for a summit of North Atlantic Treaty Organization leaders.

"We have a better relationship with Turkey, and Turkey has been in many ways much more loyal than other countries that we think would be loyal," Trump said when asked about the program.

"So yeah, it's something certainly we'd consider," he said.

The U.S. and Turkey have been stuck in a yearslong diplomatic impasse over weapons sales since Erdogan in 2017 approved Turkey's import of a Russian air-defense system called the S-400. The move triggered American sanctions, and the first Trump adminis-

tration removed Turkey from the F-35 fighter program in response.

U.S. officials are concerned that the Russian air-defense system could gather data about the F-35, including its radar signature, and send it to Moscow. The integration of the Russian system into NATO air defenses, along with the potential presence of Russian personnel, also raised concerns among Western defense officials.

In 2020, Congress passed a law that explicitly barred the U.S. from allowing Turkey back into the F-35 program until Turkey agrees to remove all S-400 systems and commits to never acquiring them or other Russian systems that could compromise the high-end jet fighter.

On Tuesday, Trump said he wanted to remove the sanctions and would make a decision about selling F-35s to Turkey—though such a move would require approval from a Congress that remains opposed to offering Ankara a way back into the program

## It's the World's Creepiest Office—And People Won't Stay Away

### New York complex vacated by IBM has become a magnet for urban explorers

SOMERS, N.Y.—Robert Carleton was getting the mail one day in April when he saw a group of teenage boys sprinting away from nearby woods. He cut them off at the road and raised his arms.

"I just said, 'Stop, it's over,'" the 62-year-old retired engineer recalled.

Soon, he said, three pursuing New York State Police troopers emerged from the tree line and arrested seven juveniles.

The criminal charge: trespassing on the former IBM campus here.

The long-vacant site has become a magnet for so-called urban explorers, who prowl abandoned malls, hospitals, power plants, amusement parks, factories and any other disused structure they can

breach.

The global "urbex" phenomenon isn't new, but it's been turbocharged by artsy videos on Instagram and TikTok that spur others to create their own posts, luring still more curiosity seekers.

Police in Livingston, N.J., recently warned people to stay out of the closed Livingston Mall property. Jacksonville Beach, Fla., police issued a similar caution in April about the shuttered Adventure Landing amusement park: "We are aware of a Tik-Tok challenge to explore the property."

In Somers, social-media images of the old IBM campus—a sprawling, pyramid-studded 1980s complex designed by the late I.M. Pei's firm—show dystopian scenes: burst win-

## AI Giants Give Away Computing Power To Attract Startups

Hans Ibarra, who is building an AI-voice startup, has found himself on the receiving end of a big opportunity: Top artificial-intelligence companies such as OpenAI, Anthropic and others desperate to win his business are increasing discounts.

Across Silicon Valley, startup founders like Ibarra are enjoying a wave of computing credits and fielding competing offers from AI-model makers racing to land new enterprise customers. Cursor, the AI-coding company bought by Elon Musk's SpaceX, offered a 75% discount through July 5.

The offers from growing AI-sales armies at companies

such as OpenAI and Anthropic are so rich that some early-stage startup founders say they won't need to raise money as soon as they expected, and others have been able to play AI companies off one another.

Startups have received offers that in some cases amounted to more than \$3 million in credits from several companies for cloud computing and tokens, the central units used to measure and charge for AI usage, founders say. That is the size of the median U.S. seed round, according to PitchBook.

Alphabet's Google Cloud is giving some startups as much as \$500,000 in cloud credits and early access to Gemini

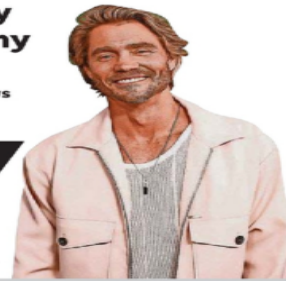

## U.S. doesn't deserve this black eye in World Cup

Trump's red-card play adds insult to injury

SEATTLE - The U.S. men's national team deserved better than this.

Not the loss that brought their World Cup party to a screeching halt in the round of 16 on Monday, July 6. They earned every bit of that, finally looking like the team everyone feared they would be at this World Cup rather than the one that had established a new standard for the USMNT.

"It stinks. I don't like to be eliminated from anything," Tyler Adams said after the 4-1 loss to Belgium that dumped the team out of the World Cup. "Tonight was not a good performance probably overall. It's not what we look to achieve. There was a lot of things that we could have done better."

"When you concede goals that easily against a team of that quality and that caliber, it's going to be difficult. We gave them good chances, or even half-chances, and they finished them. It was just a little bit too easy today."

The USMNT was tentative and sloppy, very much not ready to go toe-to-toe with one of the big European teams. Even one as vulnerable as Belgium has looked at this World Cup and without two regular starters in Kevin De Bruyne and Jeremy Doku.

The USMNT was on the back foot from the opening whistle and could never find their groove. Belgium made easy work of the U.S. defense and could easily have had another two goals in the first half alone.

Even the jubilation after Malik Tillman's equalizer in the 31st minute quickly evaporated as Charles De Kelelaere scored his second goal of the night for Belgium two minutes later.

Adams, captain Tim Ream and

**L**iuba Grechen Shirley was nursing two children when she decided to run for Congress in 2018.

• During the day, she gave speeches and knocked on doors with a baby wrapped to her chest and a toddler at her side. In the afternoons, she relied on her mother's help for childcare. Her mother would come over to watch the kids while she went back out to hit the campaign trail. • "Honestly, six months into the campaign, it was very clear to me why there weren't more moms of young children in office," Grechen Shirley said. "It really wasn't sustainable."

## Many Gen Zers not repaid for group trip costs

### Some relationships sour over upfront expenses

The trip made it out of the group chat. But for some Gen Zers, the hardest part comes after the plane has landed back home, when the Venmo requests go out.

A June 30 study from Zelle found that 76% of Gen Z consumers who have paid upfront for a group expense say they weren't paid back in full. As Gen Z, the cohort born between 1997 and 2012, emerges as a major spender

on group travel and experiences, more young people are fronting costs for friends. But many are struggling to settle up afterward, with some reporting the experience has damaged their relationships or pushed them into debt.

"Money is already so complex and complicated, and you are putting a level of trust and faith in your friends to pay you back," says Aja Evans, a licensed mental health counselor and financial therapist. "To know that you weren't paid back ... it's just a really difficult strain on the friendship."

Gen Z, saddled with student loans and entering a slowing U.S. labor market amid skyrocketing costs of living, is increasingly anxious about their finan-

cial situation. They're also seeing a stream of social media posts about living in luxury high-rises in big cities, dining at Michelin restaurants and jetting to expensive destinations.

Evans says that means more young people feel pressure to spend to fit in, whether that's saying yes to expensive bachelorette parties, last-minute concert tickets or big dinners. Nearly half of respondents to the Zelle survey say they have gone into debt to cover group expenses.

"Can you actually afford this, or does this feel like more of a flex to other people?" Evans says. "There's a lot of

# Cuban heir has open line to U.S.

## Obscure power broker has vision, access, clout

HAVANA - The Trump administration has been coy about who, if anyone, it sees as a credible Cuba interlocutor.

Raúl Guillermo Rodríguez Castro believes he is that person.

He's unknown to many outside Cuba, holds no official government office and rarely appears in Cuba's state media. He had never spoken to a U.S. news outlet before a series of exclusive interviews with USA TODAY in June in Havana.

But the favorite grandson of former Cuban President Raúl Castro and grandnephew of Fidel Castro is now in the seat of power in Havana and says he's ready to negotiate the future of his country.

And he wants to deal directly with President Donald Trump.

Rodríguez Castro, 42, has growing direct and indirect lines to senior American officials such as Secretary of State Marco Rubio; well-connected American businessmen; and a multitude of White House hangers-on, such as Victor Mello, a Republican congressional candidate in Rhode Island who twice traveled to Havana in June to meet Rodríguez Castro. (The State Department said it did not authorize Mello's trip.)

All are trying to shape the Trump administration's Cuba policy.

Rodríguez Castro speaks with

### Monaco blast Suspect shot dead in Kyiv

Anastasia Berezovska, the Ukrainian woman suspected in a bomb attack that injured a Ukrainian-born tycoon in Monaco last week, has been shot dead in Kyiv.

Ukrainian authorities said yesterday they had arrested two people in connection with her death: an active officer in Ukraine's military intelligence directorate and a former law enforcement officer.

Authorities in Monaco had identified Berezovska as the primary suspect in the attack and issued an Interpol Red Notice seeking her arrest.

The circumstances of her death and the suspects arrested in connection with it are likely to raise uncomfortable questions for Kyiv, not least over its efforts to persuade EU partners that it is ridging itself of organised crime and corruption as part of its accession bid.

# Trump threatens to pull troops out of Europe despite Nato arms pledges

Donald Trump has threatened to pull out all American troops from Europe on the eve of the Nato leaders' summit, lashing out at allied leaders who have lined up tens of billions of dollars of defence contracts in an attempt to mollify the US president.

Trump made his withdrawal threat during remarks laced with criticism of Europe, including reiterating his previous demands for the US to take control of Greenland and lambasting Nato leaders for failing to provide enough support for his war against Iran.

"We could remove all of our soldiers out of Europe," Trump said in a meeting with the summit's host, Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdoğan.

The US has 80,000 troops in European Nato nations, which the alliance sees as a deterrent against potential threats and an embodiment of Washington's support in the event of an attack.

Last month, US defence secretary Pete Hegseth announced a six-month review of America's force posture in Europe, which could lead to further troop cuts on the continent.

Nato declined to comment. Trump's threat jarred with an event

showcasing European leaders' rising defence spending that was designed to neuter his argument Europe is taking advantage of the US security umbrella.

Before Trump's remarks yesterday, Nato secretary-general Mark Rutte had hailed multibillion-dollar arms deals as "money well spent". European states announced deals for surveillance planes and cutting-edge US drones, which Rutte said were part of "a transatlantic defence-industrial revolution. The hum of machinery must become a roar."

But speaking ahead of a leaders' dinner in Ankara, Trump reiterated his anger over Europeans' lack of support for the Iran war and opposition to his proposed takeover of Greenland, owned by Nato ally Denmark. He said he was "testing" European allies with requests

for support during the conflict in Iran, "to see whether or not they'd be there."

"Why are we spending hundreds of billions of dollars, and they're not there for us? We've always been there for them," Trump said, adding that Italy, Germany and France "turned us down".

Greenland "should be controlled by the United States, not by Denmark," he said. "That's what hurt my relationship with Nato, because Greenland doesn't help Denmark."

His threat in January to use military force to take control of the vast Arctic island sparked the biggest crisis in the transatlantic alliance in decades.

in stark contrast to his criticism of European allies, Trump heavily praised his Turkish host and said that overturning his own ban on Turkey's buying F-35

fighter jets was "something certainly we would consider".

"Why wouldn't we do that? We have a better relationship with Turkey, and Turkey has been in many ways much more loyal than other countries," Trump said alongside Erdoğan in Ankara's lavish presidential palace.

The ban was imposed after Turkey bought a Russian air defence system in 2019. Trump also said the US would lift sanctions put on Turkey the year after. "We don't want to sanction friends. It's very simple," he told Erdoğan.

The US president added that if the Nato summit were not in Turkey "where my friend happens to be a very strong leader, a very strong person, it's possible that I wouldn't have attended".

## EU borders in more muddle as Brussels eyes delay to online registration system

A new online system to pre-authorise entry to the EU is set to be delayed until next year, after the chaotic rollout of a separate electronic border-check system disrupted visits to the bloc.

About 1.4bn visa-exempt travellers to the EU — including those from the UK and US — will have to register through the European travel information and authorisation system, known as Etias, which mirrors the US E-sta system. Applicants will pay €20 and undergo pre-travel security checks.

Discussions on delaying Etias follow technical glitches and slow deployment of the bloc's new electronic entry/exit system (EES), which requires non-EU travellers to scan their fingerprints and facial images at its borders.

The problems have led to long queues

at some airports and land crossings, prompting warnings from the aviation industry of a chaotic summer ahead.

EU-Lisa, the agency in charge of implementing Etias, has acknowledged its launch by the end of this year was not feasible as planned, according to three people briefed on the matter.

EU-Lisa's management board met in mid-June to discuss postponing the system, the people said. Two said the board would meet again in September to discuss a new timetable.

The agency confirmed the board discussed Etias's "crazy" into operation on June 17. "Since then there have been no further developments," it added.

The European Commission is responsible for setting a start date for the system, which it can only do after EU-Lisa has successfully tested Etias.

One person briefed on the discussions

said there were "still some IT issues" with Etias. "Let's clean up EES first before you put in another system that will double the line again," they said.

EU home affairs commissioner Magnus Brunner wrote to aviation executives blaming national governments for issues over EES. "Other factors — unrelated to the EES — like insufficient staff or lack of adequate infrastructure, could be at the origin of delays," he said in the letter, seen by the FT.

EES was originally due to start in 2022 but was delayed repeatedly by procurement and technical troubles.

"Preparations for the launch of Etias are ongoing. As with any large-scale IT system, many factors come into play when deciding when to launch," said the commission. Several officials said they were not surprised by the struggles of EU-Lisa, which also manages EES.

## City High-Rise Seen Buckling During Project

### Officials Seal Off Area Near Grand Central

Twenty-one stories above a Midtown Manhattan street early Tuesday morning, construction workers were busy converting an office building into a residential complex when it began falling apart.

"The beams started bending," said Cliff Johnsen, the business agent for the Local 638 steamfitters union, which had workers on site. Several floors were sagging. The building seemed to be crumbling fast, he said.

The workers evacuated the building, at 235 East 42nd Street, near Grand Central Terminal and the United Nations, and a supervisor called 911, prompting a hurried emergency response. Fearing a partial collapse, officials evacuated nearby buildings and blocked off several nearby streets to pedestrians and vehicular traffic.

Officials said there were no injuries, but they had seen severe structural damage between the 21st and 26th floors. The building was still standing, but it remained unstable, they said. Dozens of businesses were displaced and tourists were stranded indefinitely after the city established a "frozen zone" spanning several blocks. The cause of the incident is under investigation.

The episode stalled a project that had come to symbolize the city's ambitious effort to repurpose Midtown's empty office buildings to address the city's housing shortage. Developers called the project the largest office-to-residential conversion in city history; it had been set for completion next year.

The dramatic episode on Tuesday, though, clouded the project's future, as inspectors raced to figure out what exactly went wrong, how it could be fixed and the full extent of the problems.

At a news conference in the early afternoon, Mayor Zohran Mamdani said that building inspectors using drones to survey the 37-story building spotted two columns that had buckled, several cracks and sagging floors. The building continued to shift after the authorities arrived, he said.

"The building remains unstable," he said, urging people to avoid the area until the authorities deemed it safe.

MetroLoft, the developer on the apartment conversion, thanked city officials for their quick response and said in a statement that the damage was limited to a small area of the building. "The entire building itself is not at risk of collapse," the company said.

The Fire Department shared photos from the building on social media that showed missing paneling on the building facade and a vertical beam bent like an elbow. Fire officials said there was no risk of a full building collapse because of its steel-frame construction.

The Fire Department said it responded to a call at 8 a.m. on Monday from someone reporting bricks falling off the building.

### FACES CLAIM OF RAPE

### Sanders Joins Supporters in Urging Nominee to Get Out of Race

The implosion of Graham Platner's campaign for Senate in Maine after an accusation of rape has ripped open divisions inside the Democratic Party as its progressives and moderates battle to pick his successor even before he has said he will step aside.

National Democrats have grown alarmed that a seat seen as crucial to winning control of the Senate could be slipping from the party's grasp. Mr. Platner had survived a series of controversies — about a tattoo with Nazi symbolism, inflammatory old Reddit posts and his relationships with women — but many in the party abandoned him after the rape accusation, including the leaders of the Maine Democratic Party and Senator Chuck Schumer of New York, the minority leader.

They have demanded that Mr. Platner step down before a July 13 deadline for him to be replaced on the ballot to find a new Democrat to run against Senator Susan Collins, a longtime Republican fixture in the state. The main super PAC for Democratic Senate candidates said it would redirect \$24 million in ad reservations to other states if he remained.

Senator Bernie Sanders of Vermont, one of Mr. Platner's earliest and most prominent backers, joined the chorus on Tuesday afternoon.

"I have spoken with Graham Platner about the best path forward for Maine," Mr. Sanders said in a statement. "In light of these very serious allegations, I have recommended that he step aside."

Mr. Platner, who has denied the allegation, said on a private call with his campaign staff on Monday evening that he believed he still had leverage to influence which candidate would replace him on the ticket, according to three people familiar with the conversation. On the call, he did not announce plans to withdraw but implied such a decision would be coming, the people said.

Mr. Platner's campaign had stopped running ads on Meta's platforms, such as Facebook and Instagram, as of Tuesday, according to the company's ad disclosure database. He had been running multiple ads as recently as Monday evening.

Top Democrats believe that it is only a matter of time before Mr. Platner formally quits — and gives the party a fresh start in its bid to oust Ms. Collins, who has proved a durable foe.

The drama comes almost exactly two years after the Democratic Party was roiled by the exit of Joseph R. Biden Jr., then the president, from his re-election race and the speedy appointment of Vice President Kamala Harris as the Democratic nominee. That

## Europe's Test: Filling U.S.-Size Hole at NATO

ANKARA, Turkey — European leaders arrive for this year's NATO summit meeting in Ankara, Turkey, with the alliance under threat.

They want to keep President Trump and the United States deeply engaged in NATO, but they have come to accept that the alliance is changing — and will have to rely far less on Washington for the conventional defense of Europe.

The Trump administration has made it clear that it is withdrawing troops and capabilities from Europe to shore up American military power in the Middle

East and the Indo-Pacific, where China has become a rival to the United States.

The European governments want to ensure that the transition toward what many call NATO 3.0 is done as smoothly as possible. They want to feel confident that the gaps the Americans leave can be filled, even if imperfectly, to diminish their vulnerability to a more aggressive, militarized Russia.

The dangers of the current moment have been underscored by China's test of a long-range ballistic missile on Monday, the first such launch in nearly two years, and another huge Russian missile and drone attack on Kyiv, Ukraine's capital.

NATO leaders are expected to

endorse continued support for Ukraine, with the non-American members pledging \$80 billion this year and next. President Volodymyr Zelensky of Ukraine will attend, to press his urgent desire for more air defenses against the Russian onslaught.

Mark Rutte, the secretary general of NATO, is trying to walk a narrow line, prodding European member states to pay more for security while making sure Mr. Trump does not abandon the alliance in the process.

"We will breathe life into the concept of NATO 3.0: A stronger Europe in a stronger NATO," he said last month.

## Olympics Lifts Russian Ban, With Limits

The International Olympic Committee on Tuesday lifted its suspension of Russia related to its invasion of Ukraine, clearing the way for Russia to send a team to the 2028 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles.

The Olympic Committee said its decision applied "provisionally," subject to Russian conduct in the future, and that it had not yet decided whether it would allow the Russian flag or anthem at the games.

Still, it was a significant step for bringing Russian athletes, who have struggled with their country's pariah status on the world stage, back into the international fold after several years.

Debate over lifting the suspension centered on the Russian Olympic Committee's claims that parts of Ukraine were under its jurisdiction.

In a statement, the I.O.C. executive board said that after "thorough analysis" by legal experts, it accepted that the Russian committee no longer considered regional sports organizations in Ukrainian territory as its own, and would abstain from doing so in the future.

When the suspension was announced in 2023, Russia questioned why the international committee had not taken similar actions after Russia seized Crimea from Ukraine in 2014, according to the international organization's president at the time, Thomas Bach.

"This argument was a little bit, 'Why did you not sanction us already, earlier?'" Mr. Bach said, arguing.

## Trump eyes sale of fighter jets to Turkey

At NATO summit arrival, president again says U.S. should control Greenland

ANKARA, Turkey — President Donald Trump heaped praise on Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan as he arrived at the NATO summit on Tuesday but stopped short of publicly agreeing to give Erdogan what he wanted most — the ability to purchase U.S. F-35 fighter jets, which many in Congress oppose.

Trump extolled Erdogan as a shining example of a friend and ally. By contrast, he renewed his blasts against Denmark for not handing over Greenland, potentially reviving an explosive issue that had largely quieted since the beginning of the year.

Answering questions from reporters at the start of a meeting between the two leaders, Trump said that he thought allowing Erdogan to have access to the fighter jets made sense and that it was “certainly something we will consider.”

Erdogan offered a more definitive judgment, saying in Turkish that Trump had promised the country five planes and that “Mr. Trump always stands by his word.”

Asked whether he still felt he needed to annex Greenland, Trump said that the last round of public argument about the is-

EX-GIRLFRIEND DESCRIBES ‘SNEAKY’ BEHAVIOR  
Second woman to allege nonconsensual sexual conduct

An ex-girlfriend of embattled Senate candidate Graham Platner told The Washington Post that he repeatedly removed protection without her consent when they were having sex.

Lyndsey Fifield, who said she dated Platner from 2013 to 2015 in D.C. and has previously accused him of physical abuse, said that she told Platner on multiple occasions that he had to wear condoms during sex because she was not on birth control.

“He would pull condoms off,” she said in an interview. “He would do it in a sneaky way. He wouldn’t tell me.”

In a statement in response to questions about Fifield’s allegation, Platner’s campaign called the claim “categorically false and politically motivated.” The statement noted Fifield supported now-Supreme Court Justice Brett M. Kavanaugh when he was accused of sexual assault before his confirmation, an allegation he denied.

Fifield, 41, is the second woman to allege this week that Plat-

## Democratic factions vie to pick a new candidate

## U.S. gave Tehran details on asylum seekers, lawsuit alleges

A lawsuit filed Tuesday in Washington alleges the Trump administration violated U.S. law by providing Iran’s government with confidential information detailing the asylum applications for Iranians it planned to deport.

The extraordinary claim, out-

lined in court papers submitted by the Iranian American Legal Defense Fund and Public Ci-

zen Litigation Group, contends that the materials it alleges were shared with the Iranian government could jeopardize the lives of pro-democracy protesters along with members of religious minorities and the LGBTQ community and their families.

An annual State Department report on human rights in Iran, released last year under the

Trump administration, called the situation in Iran “severe” and worsening, with political protest movements and religious minorities targeted by authorities. Previous U.S. administrations have reported that Iranian authorities have targeted LGBTQ people for prosecution and subjected them to humiliating treatment.

“The law couldn’t be more clear that information in asylum applications is protected,” said Michael Kirkpatrick, a Public Citizen attorney involved with the complaint. He called the case “potentially a matter of life and death” for Iranian asylum seek-

## President stepped in amid Cabinet flyover spat

Backstage drama over July Fourth festivities to get around FAA objections

A dispute among Cabinet officials over who could ride in fighter jets flying over Washington on July Fourth escalated to President Donald Trump, who gave the go-ahead to acting attorney general Todd Blanche despite prior objections from Transportation Secretary Sean P. Duffy.

The backstage air show drama reflected how much the personalities of Trump and his top officials drove the official festivities to mark the nation’s 250th birthday.

The spat centered on NASA Administrator Jared Isaacsman’s plans to fly his personal collection of F-5 Tiger II fighter jets as part of Saturday’s nine-hour parade of military aircraft. ## Trans people are fleeing red states for Seattle. The city can’t keep up.

Since the 2024 election, a nonprofit has helped 1,500 transgender people settle here, a massive increase

SEATTLE — Crow Harmony never felt at ease living in Florida as a transgender guy. The state has some of the most restrictive anti-LGBTQ laws in the country, and Harmony said he struggled to find employers willing to hire trans people. Last fall, after Harmony’s boyfriend transitioned, the couple lost their housing.

They were just 21 and 20 with no money or job prospects, so Harmony reached out to a Seattle nonprofit for help getting out of Florida. The nonprofit, a trans-led organization called Traction, welcomed the couple with a place to sleep and money for moving.

But unbeknownst to Harmony, Traction was struggling, too.

Since the 2024 election, Traction has helped 1,500 trans people flee red states — more than 20 times the 70 people it aided in the 18 months before the election. And it’s just one of several Seattle nonprofits whose leaders say they don’t have the resources to help the number of trans people who’ve left their homes for the safety of the Pacific Northwest.

Though trans people make up just 1 percent of the population in Washington state, the nonprofits that help them say their budgets are drained and their staffs are stretched so thin that last month the Seattle LGBTQ Commission asked Mayor Katie Wilson (D) to declare a civil state of emergency. Such a declaration

## Race in Maine draws national concern

Allegations against candidate set back Democrats' hopes of flipping Senate seat.

WASHINGTON — The campaign of U.S. Senate nominee Graham Plater was buckling in Maine on Tuesday after he was accused of rape, injecting uncertainty into a contest that is central to determining which party wins Senate control in November's midterms.

The situation set off swift debate about how state Democrats would choose Plater's replacement if he were to withdraw, and which Maine figures might be best positioned to play off the progressive messaging he used to win over voters.

With Maine viewed by Democrats as a key seat to win in their long-shot bid for a Senate majority, the decision would be high-stakes, analysts said. In the meantime, with uncertainty clouding the race, the shake-up could put additional pressure on the party to win Senate races in states seen as more difficult to flip.

Plater has denied the rape allegation, which came in a Politico report Monday from a woman who said Plater forced her to have sex with him when he was intoxicated. Plater said Monday that he would "reflect" on his candidacy but has not withdrawn.

"The calculation that almost everyone on the Democratic side is making is that with Plater in it, it is an unwinnable race," said John Cluverius, director of survey research for the Center for Public Opinion at UMass Lowell, "and without Plater in it, they have a much better chance."

An oyster farmer and Marine veteran, Plater had entered the race to challenge Republican Sen. Susan Collins as an outsider and was seen as riding an anti-establishment wave of support.

His candidacy highlighted the split within his party between progressives and establishment Democrats and represented a matchup between an older incumbent and a younger outsider candidate.

By Tuesday afternoon, Plater's financial backing was disintegrating and prominent Democrats had withdrawn their support — including Sen. Bernie Sanders (I-Vt.), a key endorser of Plater's, who said Tuesday afternoon that he had told Plater to withdraw.

A spokesperson for Plater's campaign did not immediately respond to a request for comment Tuesday. Rep. Ro Khanna (D-Fremont), who had been one of Plater's most visible backers, quickly withdrew his endorsement Monday. [See Maine, A6]

## Support for Israel in the U.S. shrinking

NEW YORK — After decades of reliable bipartisan backing for Israel, a new AP-NORC poll reveals a dramatic erosion of support for the longtime U.S. ally, with rising opposition from Democrats and signs of division

among Republicans.

The survey by the Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research arrives at a moment when a once-consensus foreign policy issue is increasingly polarizing Americans along partisan and generational lines, driven by criticism for Israel's conduct nearly three years after the outbreak of

its latest war with Hamas in Gaza.

About one-third of U.S. adults — including roughly half of Democrats — believe that Israel has committed genocide against Palestinians during the war in Gaza, an accusation that has been leveled by some human rights organizations and vehemently denied by Israel

and the U.S. government. About 2 in 10 Americans say Israel has not and the rest, about half, don't know enough to say.

A similar share, 30%, of Jewish adults say Israel has committed genocide, although about half, 49%, say it has not.

## A taco empire, a charred body and ICE

Immigration enforcement complicates a grim murder case in L.A.

Mariana Yezpe climbed the ranks of the Los Angeles street food scene before building her own taco empire.

A native of Sonora, Mexico, Yezpe and her husband toiled at various food trucks and restaurants until 2018, when they launched a series of stands named after their daughter: Ricos Tacos Naomi.

Serving up heaps of fatty cabeza and sizzling al pastor, it grew to nearly a dozen locations spanning from Long Beach to L.A. to the Antelope Valley, drawing

praise from prominent food critics.

But now, Yezpe sits in jail — accused of plotting to kill one of her employees.

Yezpe, 43, and a worker at Ricos Tacos Naomi are charged with conspiracy to commit murder in the death of Soledad Lopez, who was last seen alive around 2 p.m. on Sept. 7. A second employee faces murder charges.

Video surveillance showed the 47-year-old Lopez leaving work at one of the taco stands with her co-worker, Sandra Romo Diaz. [See Killing, A7]

## DMV threatens to revoke licenses, cites mysterious testing 'anomalies'

Thousands of Californians have received letters from the Department of Motor Vehicles informing them that irregularities were found in their written test results and that they will lose their licenses unless they retake the exam within 30 days.

The letters have left many Californians scratching their heads as to what went wrong and scrambling to reschedule their tests to

ensure they don't lose the ability to drive.

"It's a major headache for people who maybe don't have reliable transportation," Sacramento resident David Specht said. "A single parent raising a kid, they have to take time off work, they have to get child care. It just seems like if that's our system, it isn't really working for us."

A spokesperson for the DMV wrote in an email that the agency had "identified anomalies in the results of certain knowledge tests"

and that as a result about 11,000 people are being notified that they must retake the exam.

The spokesperson said the letters were a result of the DMV's regular internal monitoring process, and did not respond to questions on the nature of the irregularities detected — such as whether they were suspected to be evidence of cheating or the result of internal technical problems.

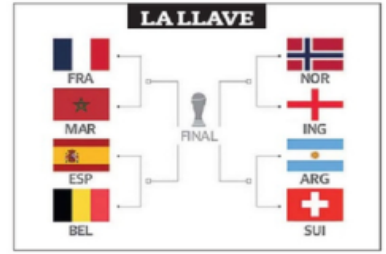

### Current chair part of mayor's nominees

Proposed picks mandated by state's transit funding and reform legislation

Chicago Mayor Brandon Johnson's nominees for the reconstituted Chicago Transit Authority board include two of the board's current members, including its chair.

Johnson's proposed transit board picks, which are subject to City Council approval, are mandated by the state's landmark transit funding and reform legislation, which took effect in June.

In addition to raising upward of \$1 billion a year for public transit, the law requires a shake-up of the boards that govern the CTA, Metra and Pace. The bill creates a new regional transit oversight body, the Northern Illinois Transit Authority, which is intended to be a more powerful version of the soon-to-be-defunct Regional Transportation Authority.

All current board members' terms expire on Sept. 1, when their replacements are expected to be seated.

But board members are allowed to be reappointed, and the majority of the mayor's picks already sit on one of the region's transit boards.

The mayor's nominees for the reconstituted CTA board include the board's current chair, Lester Barclay, an attorney who was originally appointed to the board by then-Mayor Lori Lightfoot. If approved by aldermen, Barclay would serve on both the CTA and NITA boards.

Barclay has previously criticized aspects of the new transit legislation — namely the increased oversight authority it gives to NITA.

## 'Demand is insatiable'

Summer homebuying season heats up, with packed open houses and offers above asking price

To paint a picture of the Chicago-area housing market, visit an open house and look for the pile of shoes at the front door. That's where potential buyers — who frequently remove their shoes before walking through the home — start sizing up the competition.

Real estate agents and brokers say the Chicagoland market continues to be defined by intense buyer demand for a limited number of homes for sale. It's a market where homes are sometimes listed and then sold within

days, if not hours, and where potential buyers often need to make offers that are above the asking price in order to be successful.

Tommy Choi, co-founder and realtor at Keller Williams ONEChicago, says the Chicago housing market was unusually "aggressive," in the first half of the year. And agents say home prices — and competition — are expected to heat up even further this summer.

While the national housing market shows signs of cooling, the Chicago area, by all accounts, appears to be defying gravity.

"The Chicago narrative is pretty different from what we're hearing from around the country, in places like Florida or Arizona," says David Bracy, vice president at Berkshire Hathaway HomeServices Chicago, attributing the region's extreme seller's market to simple laws of supply and demand. "(There are) 20 to 40 people coming through an Open House. The amount of demand is insatiable."

First-time homebuyers Sam Gainer and his fiancée Grace Gumbiner, both 29, say they were unprepared for the cutthroat nature of Chicago real estate. The

couple jumped into the market to escape the rental cycle before turning 30, and to avoid the yearly rental increases that nearly priced them out of their beloved neighborhood of Bucktown.

"We went to nearly 25 open houses," Gainer explained, adding that they temporarily paused their search to reassess their budget and approach. "It was a very intimidating process. You would walk in and there would be 80 pairs of shoes at the front door, and then three or four offers by the end of the day."

## Nearly full Thornton reservoir brings sewage stink and increased flood risk

With the Thornton Composite Reservoir near capacity for the first time in its history, south suburban residents are fearful of more flooding and some are sickened by the stench of sewage.

After the round of pouring rain that swept the suburbs over the weekend, the Thornton Composite Reservoir reached 94% capacity, the fullest it has been since becoming operational in 2015,

according to the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago.

As of 10:15 a.m. Tuesday, the water level had receded slightly from that high to 93% capacity, or 7.3 billion gallons, according to the district's website. The highest the reservoir has ever been before was in 2019, when it hit 94.5% capacity.

With billions of gallons of sewer water sitting open to the air, nearby residents have to deal with the stench.

"It smells," said Thornton Village Clerk Nikki Kitakis. "It's

pretty horrific."

Odors from the reservoir have been a long-standing issue for residents of Thornton, though Kitakis said the issue is particularly severe with the reservoir so full.

"The stench is putrid, and it affects all facets of life because it smells so terrible," Kitakis said. "I wish there was Smell-O-Vision so I could send a sample your way because it's, it's awful."

The water reclamation district has taken some measures to

Bernie Sanders on Tuesday became the latest and most notable lawmaker to pull support for Maine Democratic U.S. Senate nominee Graham Platner following an allegation of sexual assault, adding to a chorus of calls for him to step aside as party leaders scramble to determine the next steps.

Sanders, a Vermont independent who caucuses with Democrats, has long backed Platner in the high-stakes race against Republican Sen. Susan Collins, but he said in a statement that he spoke with the candidate and "in light of these very serious allegations, I have recommended that he step aside."

Platner, who denies the allegation, has not heeded the calls to resign. Instead, he posted a video Monday saying he was considering the next steps for his campaign while canceling town hall events.

Platner posted the video after reports that a woman who previously dated the first-time candidate said he drunkenly forced her

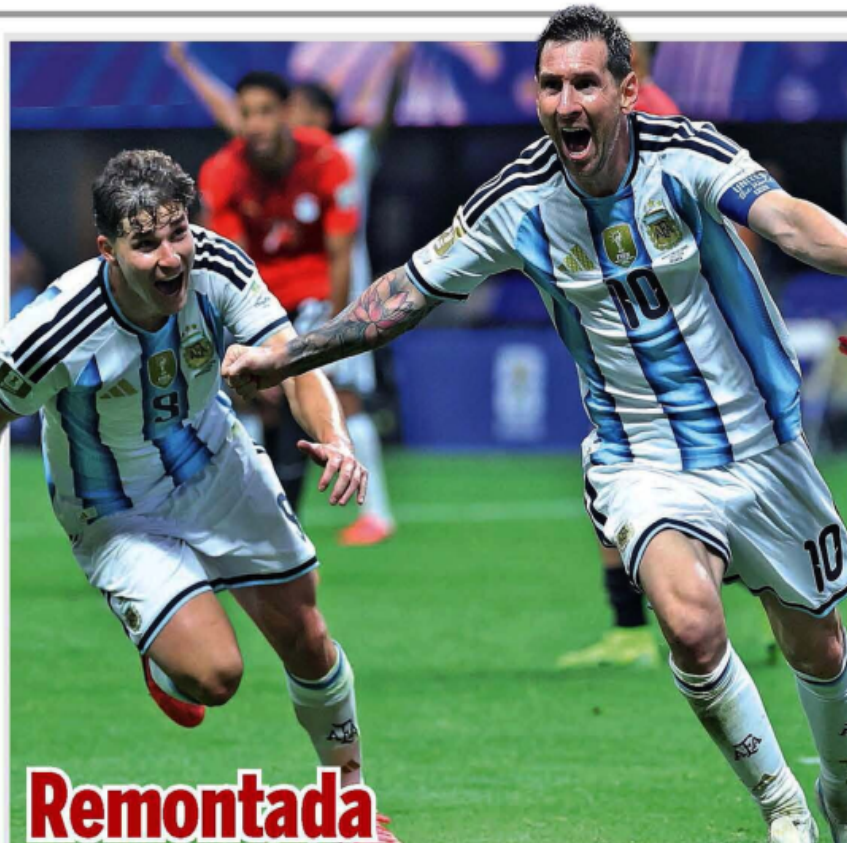

## Brasil e EUA têm menor comércio da série histórica 1 ano após tarifaço

Participação americana nas exportações cai de 12,1% para 9,4%, nível mais baixo desde 1997

A participação dos Estados Unidos nas exportações brasileiras caiu ao nível mais baixo da série histórica da balança comercial, iniciada em 1997, um ano após o presidente Donald Trump anunciar um tarifaço de 50% sobre o Brasil. ## Stage 1 CTE found in Kneeland

Study: Disease likely tied to head injuries in ex-DE who died by suicide

Former Dallas Cowboys defensive end Marshawn Kneeland had stage I CTE when he died by suicide in November, according to an announcement from the Concussion and CTE Foundation on Tuesday.

"Unfortunately, I was not surprised to find CTE in the brain of Mr. Kneeland, because we have found this progressive brain disease in nearly half of the athletes we've studied who have died before the age of 30," Dr. Ann McKee, director of the Boston University CTE Center and chief of neuropathology for the VA Boston Healthcare System, said in the announcement.

CTE — or chronic traumatic encephalopathy — is a disease likely caused by repeated head injuries, according to the Mayo Clinic. Stage I CTE has been linked to headaches, loss of attention and concentration, as well as short-term memory problems, depression, "explosivity and executive function issues," in some individuals, according to the CTE Society.

A 2023 study of about 150 athletes who played contact sports such as football, hockey and rugby and died before age 30 found more than 40% had early-stage CTE.

Kneeland's family asked for privacy, according to the announcement, but his family and his girlfriend, Catalina

## Americans split on school law

Survey: Half support having the Ten Commandments on display on public campuses

A new national survey has found that half of Americans support displaying the Ten Commandments in public schools, a policy that was recently championed and implemented in Texas.

The survey, conducted in April by the Pew Research Center that was recently released, did not include data specific to Texas, but found that residents in the southern region of the U.S. (which includes Texas) were more supportive of religious expressions in public schools than the coastal regions.

"One of the things that's clear here is that many Americans support some religious expression in public schools,"

## NATO unveils billions in new arms deals

Trump renews demand for control of Greenland; calls it 'important' for the U.S.

ANKARA, Turkey — President Donald Trump on Tuesday insisted that the United States should be in

control of Greenland rather than NATO ally Denmark, renewing tensions in Europe even as the trans-Atlantic military alliance was announcing billions in arms deals at a summit in an attempt to appease the mercurial U.S. leader.

Trump called the semiautonomous island "an important part" for the United States, as he repeated the false claim that it's surrounded by Chinese and Russian ships and said he won't let Greenland be threat-

ened.

"That should be controlled by the United States, not by Denmark," Trump told reporters during a meeting with Turkish President Recep Tayyip Erdogan in Ankara.

The NATO alliance was founded on the principle that its 32 members will defend each others' territory and not threaten to seize it. At the summit, European countries and the alliance's secretary-general, Mark Rutte, were already working

overtime to address another longstanding Trump complaint: that European allies do not spend enough on their own defense.

Separately, Trump announced that the U.S. will lift sanctions on Turkey that were issued after Ankara purchased a Russian missile defense system that led to the country being kicked out of the F-35 fighter jet program — in a nod to his warm

# Farage gamble turns to farce

Labour and Tories will not fight contest triggered by Reform leader, who is facing investigations over millions in cash gifts

NIGEL FARAGE'S gamble of resigning to fight a by-election has descended into farce after the Tories and Labour refused to stand against him.

The Reform leader declared yesterday that he was resigning as MP for Clacton and standing in the subsequent by-election. He made the announcement after facing two parliamentary investigations into donations he has received, including a gift of more than £5m from Christopher Harborne, a cryptocurrency billionaire.

Mr Farage insisted he had "done nothing wrong" and that the people of Clacton should be "the judges of my actions". But the gambit swiftly backfired as his political rivals refused to stand against him, with opponents dubbing the resignation a "circus" and a "desperate stunt".

He now faces the prospect of fighting a lone by-election or facing novelty candidates like Count Binface, who pledged to be the "unity candidate".

In a statement broadcast yesterday, Mr Farage claimed that the sleaze investigation was being used as a political tool against him and announced his resignation. "This will be a people versus establishment by-election," he said.

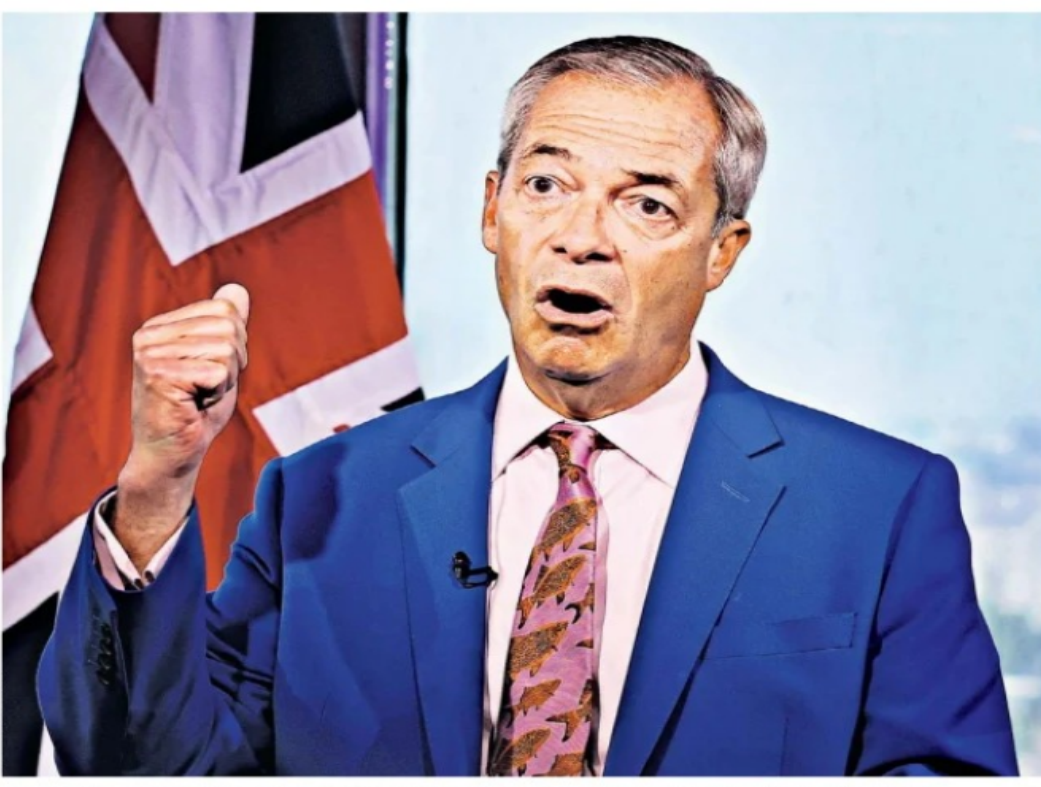
"It's a chance to stick two fingers up at the entire establishment, to frankly tell them where to go. That is why I will be putting my name forward to stand in this by-election. I will fight to win. I will fight to continue the political revolution that Reform has started."

His decision comes as he is being investigated by parliamentary authorities over allegations that he did not correctly report the £5m gift from Mr Harborne before the 2024 general election.

He is also facing a second investigation over undeclared donations from George Cottrell, one of his closest associates who was convicted of fraud in the US.

Condemnation of his decision from political opponents was swift and united, with the major political parties choosing to shun the by-election.

Keir Starmer, speaking at the Move summit in Ankara, described the move as a "desperate stunt". A spokesman for Andy Burnham, who is expected to

succeed Sir Keir as prime minister later this month, said: "This is a gimmick designed to distract from serious allegations about Farage's funders."

Mr Farage could face a second by-election within months even if he wins the upcoming vote if he is found to have broken parliamentary rules over his donations.

Such a ruling could suspend Mr Farage from the Commons for more than 10 days, automatically triggering a recall petition in his constituency. Both

the Conservatives and Restore said they would stand in such a contest, but not the upcoming by-election.

Keir Starmer, the Tory leader, said: "We will not be standing a candidate in the fake by-election that Farage is causing to distract people from what is happening. We need to let that investigation run its course, and I think the reason why Nigel Farage has resigned is because he's terrified that he's going to be found to have done something wrong."

Rupert Lowe, the former Reform MP

who now leads Restore Britain, added: "We are not going to participate in a Reform-sponsored media circus over the summer months that is designed to puff up Farage's ego and deflect away from wholly fair questions over why he has concealed such vast and irregular financial donations."

A Labour spokesman said: "Nigel Farage is engulfed in a sleaze scandal and he's desperately trying to change the subject. It's pathetic, and the Labour Party is not going to indulge it."

Farage should let the parliamentary investigation into his finances run its course and face the consequences.

Sir Ed Davey, the Lib Dem leader, said that "all parties should stand aside" if the by-election goes ahead to avoid giving "oxygen to this vanity project".

Zack Polanski, the Green Party leader, said his party would play "no part in this political circus", and added that Mr Farage was trying "to con the public", branding him "a grifter".

The situation has echoes of the 2008 decision by Sir David Davis to quit and trigger a by-election in his Haltemprice and Howden seat in protest over the erosion of civil liberties. He won the seat with 72 per cent of the vote but the by-election was a damp squib as no established parties fielded a candidate.

In 2016, a by-election for Batley and Spen was also uncontested by Labour's opponents out of respect for the seat's murdered Labour MP Jo Cox.

Reform also pledged to pay for the by-election in an attempt to get ahead of criticism from its opponents about the cost of the contest. Mr Farage said the party had approached Tendring district council and Rachel Reeves, the Chancellor, about footing the expected £250,000 bill.

The developments mean that the Reform leader, who won Clacton from the Tories two years ago with an 8,400 majority, is odds on favourite to win the by-election.

Lee Anderson, Reform's chief whip, accused opposition parties of being too "cowardly" to stand and predicted that Mr Farage would increase his share of the vote in the constituency to more than 50 per cent.

Danny Kruger, Reform's policy chief, said that if Mr Farage won the first by-election, then MPs should not attempt to trigger a second one.

"It would be absurd in my view to revisit it," he said. "If Parliament wants to have a second by-election after this one, I think the people would rightly roll their eyes."

Mr Farage has repeatedly insisted he has done nothing wrong in relation to Mr Harborne's donation, but said the establishment was out to get him.

"It seems to me that the establishment have now decided that they can beat us fairly so they've chosen to use foul means," he said. "Standards are now being used as a political tool."

The Reform leader said that he needed the £5m donation to pay for private security for the rest of his life because he is the most targeted politician in Britain.

In his statement, a visibly furious Mr Farage also accused the media of harassing his family, saying he had "never been angrier in my life". He said that the media turning up at his daughter's home had been the "final straw".

# Burnham must raise taxes by £120bn to avoid crisis, warns OBR

ANDY BURNHAM faces £120bn of tax rises or deep spending cuts to stop Britain's debt from spiralling out of control, the Government's tax-and-spending watchdog has warned.

The Office for Budget Responsibility (OBR) said public finances were on an "unsustainable" path. It warned that Britain risked being plunged into a crisis within a decade unless the prime minister-in-waiting stuck to Rachel Reeves's plans to reduce borrowing.

While Mr Burnham has pledged to follow the current Chancellor's fiscal

rules, including a pledge to bring debt down, he has also said he wanted more public control of essentials such as water and housing, which could pave the way for higher borrowing.

He has also pledged to ease the squeeze on family finances and signal that he would be prepared to impose wealth taxes to raise more revenue if, as expected, he succeeds Sir Keir Starmer later this month. Without tax rises, the OBR signalled that balancing the books would require deep spending cuts.

It said abandoning the triple lock on pensions, which has created "substantial pressure on public spending", could

save taxpayers up to £160bn a year in today's money by 2075. The OBR warned that the public finances were already in a "challenging position relative to history and to other similar countries". Official figures show Britain's debt pile is close to surpassing £3tn, equivalent to 95 per cent of GDP.

The watchdog, coupled with an ageing population, warned that increased spending on the NHS and the state pension, risked pushing the debt ratio to 300 per cent of GDP within 50 years.

It said stabilising debt at 95 per cent of GDP would require Mr Burnham, if he wins the next election, to impose tax

rises or spending cuts equating to 3.8 per cent of GDP - or £120bn in today's money. The next government could also opt for a phased tightening of £45bn of tax rises and spending cuts every decade from 2031 to stabilise debt.

However, OBR officials warned Mr Burnham that continually raising taxes would create "ever-increasing economic distortions and costs".

It said options for sustained tax increases were limited, adding that a war on wealth could backfire, while a prolonged stealth raid on earnings risks pushing an extra two million people out

of work. But it warned that any delay to fiscal tightening would only make the solution more painful in the long term.

Tom Josephs, an OBR official, said that while its projections suggested that debt would start to become unsustainable in the 2040s, he added that any decision by Mr Burnham to deviate from Ms Reeves's plans to balance the books would bring this date forward.

He said: "There are plausible scenarios where if it happens as early as the 2030s. For example, if the level of borrowing does not fall as planned over the next few years and the economy is hit by another major shock." Mr Josephs added

that successive tax raises had taken the tax burden to a peacetime high.

"Using tax over the long term as your only lever to address the fiscal sustainability pressures that we identify is likely to create ever-increasing economic distortions and costs," he said. "Over the long term, going further than that would have increasing costs, [which] is why we say that it's likely, therefore, that action to address these long-term fiscal sustainability pressures would likely be needed across many different policy fronts."

The OBR said while there were "alternative" sources of tax revenues, these would also hurt economic growth.

## Indian gang leader, associate face U.S. charges tied to Nijjar killing

Prosecutors allege Lawrence Bishnoi, deputy 'ordered the assassination' of Sikh separatist in B.C.

The leader of the India-based Bishnoi gang and his alleged North American lieutenant face criminal charges from U.S. prosecutors in connection with the 2023 slaying of Canadian Sikh separatist activist Hardeep Singh Nijjar.

An indictment filed in U.S. court July 1 and unsealed Tuesday alleges gang leader Lawrence Bishnoi and his alleged North American deputy Satinderjeet Singh, also known as Goldy Brar, "ordered the assassination" of Mr. Nijjar on June 18, 2023, at his gurdwara in Surrey, B.C.

The indictment was part of a larger investigation revealed Tuesday in Los Angeles by U.S. authorities and the head of the RCMP in which they said a total of 37

defendants — including Mr. Bishnoi and Mr. Singh — had been charged across three unsealed indictments targeting three separate transnational gangs.

Mr. Bishnoi's alleged role in the assassination has been reported before, but this is the first time it has been outlined in official charges.

Mr. Nijjar is referred to as "H.S.N." in the U.S. federal grand jury charging document, which also states Mr. Bishnoi provided four unnamed co-conspirators with a photograph of the prominent Sikh separatist and multiple addresses to help facilitate the killing.

Mr. Bishnoi and Mr. Singh, his childhood friend, who authorities say remains a fugitive in the United States, are charged with racketeering. One of the "overt acts" prosecutors cite in connection with this is their alleged role in arranging the murder

of Mr. Nijjar. Other charges include extortion — extracting money through threats of violence — as well as drug trafficking.

Mr. Bishnoi has been imprisoned in India for more than a decade. U.S. officials said they are seeking his extradition to the United States. They are also seeking extradition for several other people named in the indictments who are jailed in India.

"Some of these guys are already in jail cells in India, so obviously that's not enough to restrain their activities," Bill Esseyli, First Assistant U.S. Attorney for the Central District of California, said at a news conference in Los Angeles on Tuesday. "When they come to a federal penitentiary here, in the United States, I guarantee you he won't be extorting any more victims."

## Carney scraps Trudeau-era Senate policy as he appoints aide, Tory MP

Prime Minister Mark Carney officially abandoned a previous Liberal commitment to non-partisan Senate appointments Tuesday, naming a veteran Liberal strategist and a Conservative MP to the chamber as part of a plan to get its membership more in line with his agenda.

The appointment of Richard Martel, who has served as a Quebec Conservative MP since 2018, places additional pressure on Conservative Leader Pierre Poilievre, who has now lost five of his MPs in the past nine months. And the arrival of the strategist, Tom Pitfield, who was Mr. Carney's principal secretary, puts a Liberal operative in a realm of Parliament where Mr. Carney's predecessor had explicitly sought to lighten the party's footprint.

Mr. Martel and Mr. Pitfield will sit as independent senators, as will the others appointed Tuesday: New Brunswick's Dr. Rodney Ouellette, and Manitoba's Geeta Tucker, a corporate executive.

The appointments are Mr. Carney's first since becoming Prime Minister. He framed them as an effort to modernize the appointment process and ensure Canada's institutions are ready to deal with today's challenges.

He said he is ending the previous practice, instituted by former prime minister Justin Trudeau, of listing "non-partisanship" as an official criterion for Senate appointments.

Mr. Carney said doing so recognizes that people who serve in elected office or other partisan roles know the governing and legislative process, which he said will make the Senate more effective.

He added that going forward, he'll also be looking to the independent advisory board for Senate appointments to recommend candidates with expertise in files such as strategic industries, regulatory reform and emerging social and economic issues.

## More countries back global defence bank, but major powers remain on sidelines

Nine countries are now supporting a new Canada-led multinational defence bank. But major partners such as Germany and Britain are still absent, with the latter suggesting instead that Canada merge the bank with its own parallel initiative.

The Defence, Security and Resilience Bank, or DSRB, is a financial institution being established by a collective of countries that includes NATO members and their Indo-Pacific allies.

Albania, Belgium, Greece, Latvia, Turkey and Ukraine announced their support for the DSRB at the NATO summit in Turkey on Tuesday. They join Canada, Luxembourg and Romania — countries that previously declared their interest — in formally

establishing the institution, which aims to provide long-term, low-cost financing for defence projects by its member countries.

"We commit to providing the leadership required to advance the creation of the DSRB with the urgency demanded by the current geopolitical context, to enable the Bank to commence operations as early as 2027," the leaders of the nine countries said in a jointly written statement.

Countries all over the world are working to increase their defence spending and build up their industrial bases, spurred by rising geopolitical tension and pressure from the United States to become less reliant on it as a major military power. NATO allies, more specifically, have committed to increasing their defence spending to 5 per cent of GDP by 2035.

The Globe and Mail first reported in April that Canada had been chosen as the host country for the bank, meaning its headquarters will land in the country. Since then, Prime Minister Mark Carney has been heavily campaigning for the institution and its benefits in meetings with other world leaders.

He's been successful, to some extent, given that the bank now has several European countries on board, including Luxembourg, which is known for its financial sector.

But other major powers, such as Germany and Britain, remain absent from the list of founding countries, provoking questions about whether the bank can truly scale to the size of similar institutions, such as the World Bank or the European Investment Bank.

## Tenants smarting from rent control failure

Conditions that led to ballot question haven't gone away

Like many Greater Boston residents, Michelle Harrison's life revolves around her monthly rent payment. She has moved from town to town in Eastern Massachusetts over the past decade in search of something affordable. And when she lost

her job as an office coordinator last month, her first thought was: "How am I going to afford rent?"

Harrison, 33, had pinned her hopes for relief on rent control. As a push to cap rent increases for the first time in decades appeared to gain steam this year, she found herself picturing what life might look like without the specter of the annual rent hikes that have squeezed her budget ever-tighter.

"My rent is up \$1,000 from when I moved in six years ago," said Harrison, who now shares an apartment in Norwood with two roommates.

"That is not sustainable. And rent control could stop it."

She will have to keep waiting. The state Supreme Judicial Court last month threw out a ballot question that would have installed rent control across Massachusetts for the first time since the 1990s, dealing a sharp blow to the hundreds of thousands of everyday renters who, like Harrison, often struggle to afford sky-high rents.

The question — which would have limited annual rent increases in most apartment buildings statewide to the pace of inflation — had

gathered enough momentum to bring powerful real estate groups to the bargaining table to discuss a compromise.

Renters were the force behind it. Many young people here have friends who have decamped for cheaper areas. Young people who were sold a dream of homeownership are grappling with the reality that they may end up renting forever. Rent growth has so dramatically outpaced income gains in recent decades that some 250,000 renters, nearly half of all the renters in the

## Platner still in but hopefuls line up

Maine Democrats already focused on next nominee

Graham Platner hasn't yet announced whether he'll continue his Senate campaign in Maine following a bombshell rape allegation that landed Monday.

Maine Democrats, however, are rapidly moving forward without him.

Under Maine law, Platner can be replaced as the Democratic nominee if he withdraws before July 13 — which seems increasingly inevitable as his support collapses across the party.

The party would then have until July 27 to select a replacement. But there is no obvious existing procedure for this situation — leaving Democratic officials scrambling to devise a process to replace Platner that is fair, open, and can be concluded in time.

Meanwhile, at least a half-dozen possible contenders waiting in the wings are competing for position and letting news media know they are receiving supportive calls.

Progressive and moderate factions both in and outside Maine are escalating online battles that have become nasty, demanding the other side be blocked from influencing who succeeds Platner as nominee.

For voters, activists, and even potential candidates, it's a heady mix, and one without precedent

### Methane-eating microbes could help with potent greenhouse gas

Scientist Kathleen Savage leaned out from the basket of a boom lift, a red safety helmet perched on her head.

She sealed a few needle-covered stalks from an Eastern Hemlock tree inside a clear plastic cylinder and pulled out her phone. On the screen, a meter rose and fell as the level of gases inside the cylinder fluctuated. The question she was asking: What were the microscopic bugs on the stalks and leaves doing in there?

The answer would provide limited data — just one point, from one portion of a tree in one forest.

But looked at another way, it could also buy the planet critical time as the world races to address the climate crisis.

"These small, microscopic organisms are everywhere," she said. "When you translate that to an entire forest, they add up and pack a big punch."

## Brigham nurses poised to strike today, for a day

Would be largest in state history; hospital planning to follow with a lockout

About 4,000 unionized nurses at Brigham and Women's Hospital are slated to walk off the job Wednesday in what would be the largest nurses strike in Massachusetts history.

The threatened strike follows months of negotiations between the Massachusetts Nurses Association and the state's largest health care system. Talks ended after the two sides hit an impasse over pay increases and health insurance costs at the Harvard teaching hospital.

The strike is only scheduled to last one day, but nurses will be locked out of the hospital an additional four days, returning on July 13. That's because Brigham, one of Mass General Brigham's two flagship hospitals, is contractually obligated to provide the temporary replacement nurses that it has hired with five days of work. MGB told staff.

The dispute has the potential to disrupt care and expose discord at one of the state's most prominent and highly rated hospitals. MGB representa-

## Wrong-way crashes on the rise in Mass.

State makes changes to road signs, adds cameras

A Massachusetts state trooper, already off duty, killed responding to an errant Jeep. A Gloucester teenager, newly graduated from high school, struck head-on on Route 128. And a Haverhill man, mangled in the aftermath of a collision while driving down Interstate 93.

These are just three lives claimed by wrong-way car crashes that are increasingly common in Massachusetts.

The trifecta of fatal accidents in the final days of June, followed by yet another Monday, underscores how the problem has metastasized in Massachusetts: Citations for wrong-way driving have exploded in recent years, and the number of deaths climbed.

In each of the last two years, the state issued

## After Venezuela's devastating earthquakes, survivors ask: What comes next?

CARACAS, VENEZUELA Almost two weeks after twin earthquakes struck Venezuela, most international rescue teams have either left or are winding down operations. Foreign journalists are also leaving, and some volunteers from across the country are having to return home.

As emergency response efforts scale back, attention is shifting to recovery and reconstruction, with those affected by the disaster on June 24 confronting what comes next.

In La Guaira, the worst-affected area, many streets are now largely silent. Mounds of rubble and partially collapsed buildings that were once crowded with people searching for survivors now lie abandoned. In other areas, diggers are clearing concrete slabs, dusty debris and the remnants of ordinary life, including school books, clothes and broken furniture.

On one street, the words "We are alive" are painted in large letters on the side of a house. The owner, Daniel Tavares, is one of the only residents still living there. His house remains largely intact. He told the Miami Herald the message was intended to alert relatives that he and his mother survived, after many buildings on the same street collapsed.

But while he and his mother are alive, his 17-year-old daughter and 11-year-old son were killed in the earthquake in another area.

"I'm numb. I have so many memories," he said. "I will always cherish them, but what now?"

The death toll now stands at 3,535, but is expected to rise further, with hopes of finding survivors fading. Around 40,000 people are still registered as missing on crowd-sourcing websites.

Tavares is reluctant to leave the home where his children used to visit.

"We're waiting to see what we're going to do, whether they will demolish the houses, whether help will arrive, because

## As gay bars in Miami disappear, here's how the community keeps the party going

Willy's, the only LGBTQ+ bar in Wynwood, achieved a daunting feat in South Florida.

Its owners opened a small business in one of Miami's hottest neighborhoods, built a crowd of regulars, hosted drag shows, DJ sets and watch parties, and even threw a multi-day festival.

It was fabulous — until a developer bought the block. Willy's closed last August after just 11 months. Miami, known as a "gay mecca" for generations, is home to one of the largest LGBTQ+ populations in the South, with over 20,000 people who identify as LGBTQ+ within the city's boundaries, according to data from the city. Yet, gay-centered venues have continued to close shop and LGBTQ+ members face a dwindling number of spaces run for the community by the community.

And Miami Beach's iconic LGBTQ+ scene, immortalized in movies like Robin Williams' "The Birdcage," is now down to a handful of bars.

While long-standing institutions in Miami-Dade like The Palace, Twist and R House are still around, popular spots like Willy's and Nathan's Beach Club have closed within the last two years.

"It's pretty sad for such a large city," said Willy's co-owner Jor-El Garcia. "We really need more."

To adapt to the dwindling LGBTQ+ focused spaces, the community has created a patchwork of LGBTQ+ events and parties that pop up at local bars and venues. Willy's is keeping the brand alive with Big Wig, its annual

## They gave James Uthmeier's campaign \$25,000. Then his office stepped in to help

## Will Miami-Dade raise the gas tax and cut arts funding this year?

Facing another challenging budget year, Miami-Dade's mayor this week revealed she won't be diverting money from charity and arts grants or raising new revenue by making drivers pay more for gas or transit passengers pay more for rides.

Mayor Daniella Levine Cava told a town hall Monday night that her 2027 budget proposal contains "serious belt

tightening" but that she won't be calling for the nonprofit grant cuts that were one of last year's top budget controversies before the mayor retreated on that \$40 million austerity measure. Still, the mayor, who has vowed not to propose property tax increases, offered no hint at where the cuts will come.

Levine Cava confirmed to the Miami Herald after the event that her budget proposal would maintain the current level of funding for county-funded charities — known as

community-based organizations, or CBOS in county parlance — and for existing arts grants, which were also subject to cuts in last year's budget plan before the mayor dropped that plan, too.

In taking arts and charity cuts off the table, Levine Cava has narrowed her options for closing what this year's forecast projects as a \$173 million revenue gap for the 2027 budget year, which begins Oct. 1. That figure has likely grown in the

# Farage's £5m gift reported over money laundering concerns

● Revelation comes as Reform UK leader quits as MP, forcing byelection

● But move appeared to backfire as rivals say they will not contest seat

The £5m gift to Nigel Farage by a cryptocurrency billionaire was reported to the National Crime Agency by bankers who were concerned it may have been laundered money, the Guardian can reveal.

The disclosure will put further pressure on the Reform UK leader, who is awaiting a decision by the standards commissioner over whether his failure to declare the money breached parliamentary rules.

Farage was given a deadline of 1pm yesterday to respond to the Guardian about this article. He gave a video address at 2pm announcing he would force a byelection in his seat of Clacton.

That attempt to shake off the deepening scandal over his finances appeared to have backfired last night as the Conservatives, Labour, Restore Britain and the Liberal Democrats all announced they would not stand candidates in a contest described as a "media circus" and "vanity project".

If Farage were re-elected, he would still be likely to face the parliamentary investigation and any reprimand that might follow.

The Guardian first revealed in April that Farage had been given £5m by the Reform donor Christopher Harborne.

Since then Farage has given differing explanations over what the money was for, and insisted he had no obligation to disclose it because he was not a politician at the time, claiming it had no bearing on his decision to stand in the 2024 general election.

However, the latest Guardian investigation will raise fresh questions over the gift.

According to financial industry sources, Farage received at least some of the £5m after he had announced on 23 May 2024 that he was not going to stand for parliament, saying it was "not the right time for me".

The balance of the £5m was received after he had ruled himself out, and shortly before he said he would run for the seat of Clacton in Essex.

The disclosure of the £5m gift has led to the biggest crisis of Farage's political career.

In correspondence with the Guardian, Harborne's lawyers have claimed Farage received the money on 5 April 2024.

They did not provide a substantive response to detailed questions on the gift and a suspicious activity report (SAR) to the NCA. Instead, they asked for a copy of any documents in the Guardian's possession.

In one of the letters sent to the Guardian, Farage said he did not

know about the SAR. He added: "I have no reason to doubt the ultimate source of the money."

He also repeated unsubstantiated accusations that the information had been "illegally obtained" by this newspaper.

Farage has said he was not in politics at the time, and claimed that meant he was under no obligation to disclose it.

But within weeks - on 1 May 2024 - he became "a person of significant control" for Reform's corporate entity, meaning he in effect owned and controlled the party. He was also honorary
